140 years of worship and praise has been happening at Howard Uniting Church. We praise God for the faithful people who have worshipped at Howard Uniting Church, for those who have preached, those who taught Sunday School, the musicians over the years, those who have been stewards, elders, church councillors and on many boards and committees, the people who have cleaned and maintained the building and the people who have tirelessly worked to raise money for the church and many charitable organisations who they have supported.

There has been such change in the community since 1884 when the church was dedicated as a Primitive Methodist Church. It has been a church that has continued to serve the community the only time it did not hold services was during the recent Covid pandemic but as soon as it was possible to hold services they started again.

In 1977 with the coming together in God, of, The Congregational, Methodist and the Presbyterian Churches the Uniting Church in Australia was formed and so Howard Methodist Church became Howard Uniting Church.

Memories of Howard Uniting Church (by Pastor Graham Huth)

I have very strong and fond memories of the Howard Uniting Church during the time of ministry at Hervey Bay from 2007 until 2017. On the Sunday mornings I travelled to Howard it was usually following a 7.30am service first at Burrum Heads. After an early morning start, a brief stopover at the Burrum Heads boat ramp to pray and prepare myself, and then worship with the folk at Burrum Heads I would set out on the 20-minute drive to Howard. As I was invariably a bit late due to time restrictions and not wanting to simply preach and run at Burrum Heads, I would be greeted on arriving at Howard by the sounds of singing drifting across the car park as the congregation, accompanied by Janet Stocks on the organ, enthusiastically sang favourite choruses.


Worship and fellowship at Howard were always warm and I left uplifted, as if I was the one being ministered to, and not the other way around. And perhaps that is exactly what happened.

I never really needed to worry about either breakfast or lunch on those days because of the renowned hospitality of the Howard congregation. There were never 12 baskets of crumbs left, but my memory was that we all left comfortably full, and there were still leftovers that were shared across the church community.

Perhaps one of the surprise highlights of my time came from realising I was following in the steps of my grandfather Rev Rudolph Huth. Upon picking up a copy of the 1984 Anniversary book, my eyes were drawn to the list of ministers, which revealed that Granddad Huth was minister for Howard during World War II (1940-1943), and at a time when Howard was connected to the Childers Methodist circuit. I knew Rudolph had been at Childers because I recalled stories of the family travelling to Scarness for day trips and holidays but had otherwise missed the significance. Thus, it held a sense of delight to find myself standing and preaching in the same place from which my grandfather preached as a young minister around 70 years earlier. Now, as the Mary Burnett Presbytery Minister, I again find I play a part in the ongoing mission and ministry of the Howard Church and congregation. The stories I hear continue to delight and speak not only of the faithfulness of the members of the church in maintaining a place of worship but striving to be a beacon of the light of Christ across the Howard district. Congratulations Howard UC on reaching this milestone, and I pray that you flourish as you continue to live a life of worship, witness and service as Christ will lead you.

'Our lives today are far removed from those faithful people who built the church in 1884.

"How does one tell the story of 100 years?

How does one tell what it was like in just one of those years?

Can we again live the days of kerosene lamps and sailing ships. Is there an imagination so vivid to live again on $\pounds 6.00$ a month (approx. \$12.20). Can there be a night when a whole town comes out to pack a theatre for church service.

Was there ever a time when there were no television sets and no trains to Howard from Maryborough.

We honestly won't try but we will peek through the window of memorabilia, to those people in those days"

There are many reasons why people flock to live in a new community.

It was not a March out of Egypt to the promised land that first brought settlers from across the world to BURRUM. It was not even the black gold to begin with. It was a search for a sawmill site that brought two brothers Robert and John Miller up The Burrum river in a sailing boat.

They found a site and skilfully used the tidal water to drive their machinery of their sawmill. The sawn timber was shipped the long way round to the growing town of Maryborough. This was their source of supplies. While fishing for fresh food John Miller dislodged a piece of coal from the bank. Their find did not bring wealth to them but gave a new direction to the community.' You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden. Musings of Jack Whitby dec.

This is an extract from the Century Booklet by long time and valued member of the Howard Church.

'What is our centenary? thoughts by Jack Whitby for our congregation

As I take up my pen to contribute to this centenary souvenir booklet, I ponder on what the celebration means to me and also to you. It would mean many things to many people.

To me it means a time of reflection on the work of those magnificent men ably supported by their loyal wives who 100 years ago and since laboured so diligently and arduously to establish their church primitive Methodist in the Burrum area.

Looking back through the Vista of time and great challenge I see periods of immense hardship toil sweat anguish and weekends absence from their families as they rode horseback to spread the gospel and established congregations in neighbouring townships of Torbanlea, Horton and Pialba. At the same time, they were doing spade work to firmly establish their own church in Burrum and later in Howard they sacrificed a goodly portion of their meagre weekly pay packet to build and furnish their church or to the glory of God

During my adolescence and in the later years I witnessed and was stimulated by the continuance of this work and have a deep and abiding respect for these men of God in whose shadow we live and move and strive to keep God's Barque (Barque is a type of sailing vessel) afloat in the troublous seas of modernism commercialism and fanaticism.

By the help of God, they prevailed and so will we if we do not allow our faith to be dimmed by things physical and material.

I know you all pay tribute to our founding fathers and join with me in praising God for their lives and testimonies.

This cleaning from the work of George Matheson should set us on a target as we launch into our 2nd century; - "there are songs that can only be learned in the valley. No art can teach them; no rules of voice can make them perfectly sung. Their music is in the heart. They are songs of memory, of personal experience. They bring out their burden from the shadow of the past; they mount on the wings of yesterday."

So, may we too, use the wings of yesterday to ride on into tomorrow with the songs of the memory of our forefathers in our hearts. May their personal experience of service for Christ and his church be ours also.

They suffered many physical and financial hardships.

Ours is by nature a different climate, with more weariness of soul and spirit but we cannot give into pessimism as so many depend upon so few trying very hard to keep today's world on an even keel.

May God grant us wisdom to practise the knowledge we have gained through the experiences of the prophets of old, our elder brother and his disciples and from our own forefathers.

We hope, through the help of God, we can hand on the torch to future generations, as untarnished as we received it.

To those privileged to attend the centenary celebrations, we hope it will be an occasion of happy reminiscence and renewal of many friendships found and kept within the ambit of the Howard Church.

The beginnings of Church in Howard

1884 is the start of the building's history but not that of the church in Burrum. The first church it is believed to be a slab one of bush bearers and choice stumps. The men and women who came and established this work for God here, came from buildings that had been there for some five to eight hundred years. It must have been a daunting task.

We remember the earlier settlers that came to NSW. Yes New South Wales as it was only 42 years since that last convict ships arrived NSW and only 25 years before the building of the church did Queensland became a colony. People who had faith and for whatever reason brought them they wanted to be in a community of people that loved God.

Timeline

a time to weep, and a time to laugh; a time to mourn, and a time to dance; Ecclesiastes 3:4

Here is a timeline of interesting things that have happened in the world and the Howard Church

- **1842** Last convict ship arrived at New South Wales
- **1859** The Colony of Queensland was established
- **1863** Coal was found by the Miller brothers
- 1866 Mining started in Howard.

1875 Wesleyan Minister Rev. Parkinson held monthly services at the home of Mr and Mrs Abel Steley at Burrum. These services were held on Monday evenings. Services each week were held at the home of Mr Thomas Watson snr and Thursdays he held prayer meetings..

1879 A temporary building was erected in the style of the slab huts of the time. This church housed the first district provisional school.

1879 Wedding of Jane Thomas and Joseph Steley. The first wedding celebrated in Howard


- **1880** Sunday School was opened
- **1881** population 25 people

1883 St Matthew Church of England opened (closed in 2016)

1883 Railway line opened bringing immigrant labour to the town. 3 of them were George Barker, John Tench and Charles Whitby and were Primitive Methodist. These 3 and their families who

through enthusiasm and leadership of Rev. Edward Knights built the church that is still here 140 years later. They would also go onto building Horton, Torbanlea and Childers Churches.

1884 Howard Church Was dedicated to God was built to seat 200 Cost £307.15s.7p It was built by Steve Ward who also built Brooklyn House.



1884 The Sunday School was

opened on the 13th May, Mary Steley (nee Marshall) was one of the first Teachers

1884 For a skilled worker, the wage was between 7-12 shillings per day who were not supplied board and lodgings. If board and lodgings were included in their income it would have been 20 to 50 pound per year depending on the job.

1884 in this year, was the first Christian missionary arrives in Korea.

1884 Lewis Edson Waterman invents the first practical fountain pen and James Ritty invents a functional mechanical cash register. Both of these inventions would become invaluable to VanCooten who is also celebrating 140years.

1886 Horton Church was built to seat 100 Cost £80

1886 John Pemberton introduces <u>Coca-Cola</u> (a world changing product)

1886 Nicolette Bruining, Dutch theologian, humanitarian is born (d. 1963)

1887 Andrew Fisher arrives in Howard (he becomes the first Labour Prime Minister in Australia) while living in Howard he worked as a coal miner. His home he built and occupied for 6 years still stands in Watkins St.

1891 Torbanlea Church built to seat 80 Cost £84

1891 The Australian shearers' strike, that leads indirectly to the foundation of the Australian Labor Party, begins.

1891 In the Kuperovskaya district of <u>Vladivostok</u>, a grand ceremonial inauguration of construction work on the <u>Trans-Siberian</u>

<u>Railway</u> is carried out by the Tsesarevich Nikolay Alexandrovich, and a <u>religious service held</u>

1892 The zipper was invented

1895 Howard Catholic Church was opened

1896 Childers Church was built and to seat 200 Cost £265

1896 First Howard organ purchased from Cornish and Co, Washington, New Jersey USA for £21.10s.0d it came with stool and book and had a Guarantee of 10 years. Extract from the centenary booklet.

'Harmony has been learned by many communities, from the harmony of the music they play in bands and sing in choirs. To have a church which was founded by the families from Wales and England, surrounded by the miners from the old country, and not have good music and good musical instruments would have been unthinkable. So, the best was sought and the best was used at this congregation so long ago'

1896 the first modern Olympic Games, are held in Athens, Greece.

1896 Walter Arnold, of East Peckham, Kent, England, is fined 1 shilling for speeding at 8 mph (13 km/h), exceeding the contemporary urban speed limit of 2 mph (3.2 km/h), the world first speeding fine

1898 Childers wanted to separate from the Howard circuit due to growth in the area. Was discussed for a new circuit of Howard, Burrum, Torbanlea, Aldershot, Walker Street Maryborough, Tinana and Yengarie and the discission was deferred for one year. This did not happen until the Union of the Methodist Churches.

1898 Church choir formed

1899 Ladies Help Society was formed

1901 Primitive Methodist Church merged with other denominations to be come the Methodist church of Australasia, Mainly called Methodist Church

1901 2 Kerosene Lamps were bought to light the church

1909 the Church was extended by 12ft to the current size cost of the extension was \pounds 52.15.0

1910 5 tier collapsible stage built by Steve Ward as a labour of love and a gift for Sunday School anniversaries. It expanded across

the whole church and could seat 100 children. Sadly, time has come and gone and age gets to us all

1910 Mr T. J. Watkins generously donated the allotment adjoining the Church

1911 Howard population 1502

1912 The Burrum Church destroyed by cyclone and rebuilt (unknown when it closed)

1917 Communion Cloth was embroidered with the names of the congregation members

1919 All building works had been paid for.

1923 Mr T. Pollard formed a club of senior boys

1928 Junior choir was formed that gave joy to many people

1929 Herbert Carter who came from England to work in Home Mission service within the Methodist Church

'was appointed as a married man to Howard. No parsonage or quarters were available, so he lived on one farm and various houses in town. Had a service in the Picture Theatre which was packed. Preached on: - If Christ came to Howard, what would He say, what would He do, where would He go?' (extract from Mr Carters diary)

1929 Fred Hollows, New Zealand-Australian ophthalmologist is born (d. 1993)

1929 Albanian missionary sister Agnes Gonxha Bojaxhiu, later known as Mother Teresa, arrives in Calcutta from Ireland to begin her work in India. (b1910-d.1997)

1932 Ladies Guild and the tennis club asked to support the Church building fund.

1934 Torbanlea granted permission to add a 16ft x 12ft vestry

1936 There was a move for Howard Church to join the Walker Street circuit or revert to a Home Mission Station as they couldn't carry on as a circuit unless an adequate grant of £50 or £60 a year be received from Home Missions

1936 Regular religious education lessons are given at Howard, Torbanlea and Takura schools also services started in the Burrum Church on alternate Sundays **1939** a grant of £10 a quarter allocated to Howard Home Mission Station

1941 Howard Home Mission Station attached to the Childers circuit and Rev. R. Huth of Childers directed to take charge and conduct as many services as possible

1946 Request for Howard Home Mission Station to join the Walker Street Circuit sent to Conference

1947 Lot in Burrum Heads bought for £5

1947 Church vestry opened and the Howard state school drum and pipe band performed at the ceremony


1947 The Conference resolved that Howard cease to operate as a Home Mission and to be linked with Childers to form the Howard/Isis circuit

1951 Power station opened at Howard

1951 Superglue was invented

1952 Brick pioneer memorial wall was dedicated by Conference President Rev H.A. Denn. Music was provided by Maryborough Salvation Army Band.

1955 Horton Church was moved to Howard as Church Hall. Dedication service was conducted by Rev Ken Horton of Walker St. Maryborough



1957 Kitchen and servery added to hall.

1958 Ladies Guild donated 12 hymn books

1959 Fluorescent lights installed in the church and church porch

1960 Rev. Rex Smith donated 2 fans for the church from the Brisbane Theatre Royal on its closure as he had family connections with the theatre

1961 10ft extension added to hall to increase the size of the Sunday School

1962 The installation of the illuminated cross in the memory of the late Colonel Eric Paterson, Trust secretary at the time of his

death. A gift from his loving wife and dedicated at a special service on Sunday $28^{\mbox{\tiny th}}$ of October

1967 Book cupboard for the vestry and a clock for the church was donated by Mrs N. Paterson

1968 Rev. Ivan Acorn guest preacher at 84th anniversary celebrations. Special musical program arranged

1968 Church trust in best financial position for, maybe all time, with a credit balance of \$415.31. This was lifted by an unclaimed sum of 0.71 cents found in the church hall

1969 Church's 85th anniversary celebrated with Morning and Evening services and a pleasant Sunday afternoon with the Childers choir participation. A fellowship tea was served. Rev. Owen Marks of Pialba was the guest preacher.

1969 Man walks on the moon

1971 The 87th Church anniversary was conducted by Rev. O. J. Gunders of Bundaberg. There was a morning service with a pleasant Sunday afternoon service at 3pm and a fellowship tea at 5pm

1971 Church exterior painted by Mr Bob Bushnell for a very reasonable sum.

1971 A very successful flower show was held.

1971 100ft of reject earthenware pipes bought to drain the church property

1971 Order from the Wide Bay electricity to have an inspection of all electricity, lights and outlets in the church and hall

1972 The church property board formally the (Church Trust) was voted to be absorbed within the funds of the Joint Finance Committee and all business coordinated in Childers by the Parish Council of which, Howard, Torbanlea and Burrum Head have representation.

1976 Mining explosion at Torbanlea results in 5 casualties

1976 Burgowan mine 13 closes. It was the last pick and shovel mine in Australia

1977 The Congregational, Methodist and the Presbyterian Churches came together to form the Uniting Church in Australia

1980 Power station at Howard closed

1990s Howard became part of the Hervey Bay Uniting Church and are still under their administration today

1994 Meals on Wheels started operating out of the Howard Uniting Church Kitchen

1997 End of the mining era, Burgowan Number 12 mine closes. Number 12 mine operated from 1910 to 1997.

2014 6th of April with great sorrow it was decided to close Torbanlea Church due to the cost of maintaining the building. Howard Uniting Church was still able to meet the worshipping community needs as it is only 5km away.

2015 ramps installed on hall and into the vestry for easy access

2015 The Torbanlea Church was sold

2016 Windows replaced on the church and hall. Shape of the original windows kept

2017 Exterior of the church and hall, painted with cream and heritage red

2020 Does not hold services from the 5^{th} of April through to the 2^{nd} of August resuming services on the 9^{th} of August due to covid shutdowns.

2021 Population of Howard in 2021 1394

2021 Church and vestry painted internally

2021 Floors in the church were sanded and coated with an oil sealant

2022 New church sign put on the corner of Coal and Watkins Street

2022 We enter the electronic age. A screen was installed in the church for the congregation to follow the service. This was donated by Beverley Baillie a member of the Hervey Bay congregation

2023 With the help of Hugo Nolan from Hervey Bay we had a sound system installed. Hugo will be greatly missed for all the work he has done as a member of the church council and supporting Howard. 'You were needed elsewhere, RIP Hugo'

2023 Ogan no longer working currently using a keyboard lent to us by Cristi-Mari Smit wife of current Minister Rev. Willem Smit

2024Pews get afaceliftwithlocallymadecushions

2024 replaced front stairs by a local builder,

Pearts Plumbing Hervey Bay installed a zip water heater for coffees.

2024 The hall was restumped



2024 New Sign at front entry of the church that matched the one that is on the corner of Coal and Watkins St

The early pioneers

It was the early settlers who came to the area, with the knowledge and a relationship with, the risen Jesus, in search for a better life.

They came together, worshipped in homes, and built a basic shelter. Their lives were full of the love for their God. Not only did they work, raise money to build a place of worship, they also went spreading the Gospel in the nearby towns, remember it was before the road system we have now and before cars.

When the forefathers of the church came here there was no running water, electricity or flush toilets, no heating or air conditioning. It would have been a hard life, but they never strayed from God when the going got tough.

They wore clothing alien to us today, ladies with high neck lines, hemlines that touched or just about touched the ground, with tight sleeves and corsets and don't forget the hat or bonnet whenever outside.

The men had vests and coats and hats.

But those who trust in the Lord, will receive new strength. They will fly as high as eagles. They will run and not get tired. They will walk and not grow weak. Isaiah 40:31

Ladies Guild

Ladies have been a vital part of the church, even in the days when women could not vote, own property or take a ministry role in the church. They are the ones that showed hospitality by feeding, clothing and caring. It was women in the early days that worked hard in garments that I know I could not bear to wear.

In the 1950s ladies from the guild were cutting stumps with crosscut saws while the men were felling trees.

The Ladies of the church have raised thousands of dollars through cooking, sewing, gardening and having produce stalls.

They enriched the whole community with garden parties and flower shows.

In the 1990s They had a fashion show and modelled the clothing from VanCooten's drapery.

They have always had a heart to serve.

Picnic days

Held as close as possible to May Day. It is rumoured that many romances started at these picnics that led to Wedding Bells. When some picnics were held on one of the congregant's citrus orchards, you would find the youngsters in the packing shed enjoying an orange or two.

Organist

Gert Whitby was the main organist for many years. She also would give free organ lessons to any child who wished to learn on the proviso they attended Sunday School.

Our current main organist is Jeanette Stocks who drives out from Hervey Bay on Sundays to worship and play for us. We love and thank her very much.

Communion Cloth

We have a communion cloth that has been preserved under glass. On it is hand embroidered all the names of the congregation from 1917. It is a wonderful piece of work and scrolling through all the names we will find many of the Howard Street names listed and in particularly, the Van Cootens, of Van Cootens groceries, that we are celebrating 140 years with, over the weekend of the 7th and 8th of September 2024 We don't know why this cloth came about but seeing the year that it was made, it may have been a way of raising money for those who were away during World War II.

Our Church community




