Some of the highlights from the past year

The First of Everything

Over the past year I had the opportunity to experience almost the first of everything, some first do, however, stand out above the rest.

Covid-19 (March 2023)

One would not necessarily put Covid-19 as a highlight. However, it turned out to be a truly blessed time for us. First, we experienced a level of care from the congregation that I have not experienced at any other congregation I had the opportunity to serve in. Members continually blessed us with home cooked meals over this time. Many thanks to all who showed love and care for us. Secondly, since arriving in Hervey Bay we had a struggle to find a GP, members of the congregation recommended their GP's and we ended up with a list of almost 20 GP's to contact and see if they accept new patients. It had to be the 4th or 5th practice we contacted that was willing to accept new patients and now we have a GP in Hervey Bay.

Easter Time

It was adventurous to have two Maundy Thursday Services, one in the afternoon and one in the evening. Both those services were well attended, and we were able to minister to more people by having two services.

10 Days of Prayer (between Ascension Day and Pentecost)

It was a wonderful time spent in prayer. However, it was sad to see so few people attend these prayer meetings.

Training

Even though it remains a struggle to find training opportunities in our local area, I did manage to stay up to date with all the mandatory training and completed as part of my Continuing Education for Ministry Agents (CEM) two subjects (in the fields of Church Management and New Testament Studies) at the South African Theological Seminary, being a correspondence institution it allowed me to complete the training in the comfort of my home office.

Synod 2023

In October I attended my first Synod meeting. I consider the meeting to be good even though the meeting debated the future of Chaplaincy in the Public Hospital Space.

Mother-in-law, Christmas Carols and Covid.

A truly mixed bag of stuff happened to us during the closing of the year 2023.

Just to give some context.

Around mid-November we received news that the health of Christi-Mari's mother was deteriorating faster than expected. This meant we boarded a plane on Tuesday 14 November 2023 to pay mother-in-law a visit. On Wednesday 22 November we greeted mother-in-law for what turned out to be the last time. We arrived back in Hervey Bay on Friday 24 November 2023. During the time we were away the church got decorated, final arrangements were made for our Christmas Carols weekend on the 25 and 26 November 2023. The Christmas Carols BBQ and Service was probably the best and most beautiful Christmas Carols event I was a part of in many years.

It would have been on the flight between Dubai and Brisbane that we caught Covid-19 again, with Christi-Mari testing positive on 26 November 2023 and I a couple of days later.

On Wednesday 29 November 2023 around 11:30 pm (Hervey Bay Time) mother-in-law passed away. While still recovering from Covid-19, funeral arrangements were made and we left for South Africa on Monday 4 December 2023 to attend and participate in the funeral of Christi-Mari's mom.

During this chaotic time of ups and downs, we truly felt the support and prayers of the local congregation. From helping with making the Christmas Carols events extra special to caring for us while recovering from Covid. Your prayers and messages of support are truly appreciated. Regular Ministry Activities

Wednesday Evening Bible Study

During the year we covered many Bible books and certain topics that arose during the year. In the first term we studied the Gospel of Matthew. In term two, we studied Song of Songs and Colossians. In term three, we studied Ecclesiastes. In term four, we covered topics such as Bible Translations, Prayer, and the Work of the Holy Spirit.

In January 2024 we already studied the shortest book in the Old Testament, Obadiah. In term one we will be studying the Gospel of Mark.

Church in Afrikaans

September 2023 saw the first service in Afrikaans, and we had 37 people attending the first service. In October 2023 there were around 30 people attending. Church in Afrikaans fits well with the broader Uniting Church in being a multicultural church. This means we are hosting two cultural groups in our building for services of worship (Koreans and Afrikaners). At the last service in January 2024, we were about 45 people in attendance with around 30 families (representing around 70 people) in our contact register.

TriCare Services

In January 2024 we had our first service at TriCare in Point Vernon, and it was a blessed time.

On a Personal Note

Permanent Residency Visa Granted

On the 31st of January 2024, we received our Permanent Residency Visas. Thank you to all who were praying for us regarding this concern.

Discerning the Future

It is with hope that we look to the future and to the next year.

Ministry at Aged Care Facilities

Towards the end of the reporting year, we had two Church Growth Workshops. At the first workshop, we acknowledged that we are a congregation serving the retired person and that there are many opportunities to grow our congregation. Covid-19 meant a lot of ministry opportunities in the aged care facilities were lost and relationships with the aged care facilities were lost. Over the next year, I will work hard in establishing new relationships with the aged care facilities, especially the aged care facilities owned and managed by the greater Uniting Church (Fraser Shores and Master's Lodge). Hopefully the building of these relationships will not just lead to more ministry opportunities for us but will lead to new people joining our church and attending our activities.

A Church for Families

At the Church Growth Workshops, we also said we want to become a church for families and to be a multi-generational church. In the short term we may not see much happening in this space other than some small additions in the Sunday Service like the inclusion of modern hymns and a the establishing of a space "for the young at heart" in all our services.

Over the course of the next year, I will work with our school chaplains and RI teachers in the best way to become a multi-generational church where all can feel welcome and included in our services of worship.

Being a known Church

It is sad that many people are simply not aware of our existence. In the coming year I hope that we can be a more known church in the community. I hope that when people move to Hervey Bay from other areas that they will at least consider visiting us and in the longer term become involved in the life of the church and in the mission that God has for us. To achieve this, I will be working on the following:

- 1) To establish a working relationship with 105.1 Rhema Wide Bay radio station and to promote the church and our activities on the Radio Station.
- 2) To upgrade our website so that our digital spaces are inviting and welcoming.
- 3) To develop a better marketing strategy and marketing material.

I do hope that, when people in the street see me with my “Hervey Bay Uniting Church” polo shirt on, they do not have to ask who and what we are, but that they will know who we are, what we do, but more importantly that they are welcome in our church.

It was truly a privilege to serve you over the past year. I am forever grateful for the opportunity that this congregation is affording me to live out my calling. I am looking forward **to grow in the love of God, to make disciples and to show His love in all we do** with you in Hervey Bay, Howard, Burrum Heads and beyond.

Thanks, must also go to Rev Willem Smit for his positive leadership and chairing the Church Growth meetings. We have seen welcome changes to the Hervey Bay morning worship including a move to modern hymns and responsive readings.

Our focus must now be on the future and the way we communicate the Gospel and connect with the community. It is one thing to feel comfortable in our church environment, it is another to reach out to a world of hurt and unjustness.

As this will be my last annual reporting on Finance position of our church, I will briefly provide an update on the end of year position for the 2024 Financial Year and the year-to-date position at 31 December 2024 for both Dan Dinna House and Hervey Bay Uniting Church accounts. I will then proceed to provide details of other events that have impacted our financial position, most have been in a positive way. A summary will conclude the report on our way ahead.

Financial Year 2023 – July 2022 to June 2023

At the end of the 2023 Financial Year, there was a deficit of \$2,882 in the actual position which was primarily due to an additional cost of refinishing the hall floors at Dan Dinna House. A budget of \$1,000 was allocated but actual expenditure was \$3,770, \$2,770 more than budget.

However, with the installation of new solar panels at Dan Dinna House by 60s & Better, our Leasee for that complex, following a grant received, savings in electricity charges offset this property maintenance overspend to some degree.

Against the approved budget, there was a total variance of **-\$,4201** which was primarily due to property maintenance costs but added to by some cancellations in hall hire outside lease hour.

At the end of the 2023 Financial Year, there was a surplus in the Actuals position of our church. While there was a savings of \$28,000 as no ministry agent was in place from July to October 2023, expenditure during the financial year resulted in approximately \$24,000 offsetting expenditure.

The reasons for this finance position on 30 June 2023 are:

- With no ministry agent until 1 November, there was a saving of \$28,681.52 against ministry and staff related costs. This savings allowed expenditure of \$2,673 towards JNC related travel and \$9,000 contribution to relocation costs for our new minister.
- While some further savings were achieved, e.g., our monthly Mission and Service Fund which was reduced by Mary Burnett Presbytery by \$300 each month, some income accounts were considerably under what had been planned for. These included:
 - Offerings from our Hervey Bay Congregation which was down by \$15,132.95 on budget plan. Offerings received from Howard and Burrum Heads congregations close to budget.
 - Direct deposits account was also \$4,646 below budget plan. Direct deposit arrangements with banks can sometimes have an end date so it is hoped that less direct deposit monies may be due to this happening with some contributors. I remind all contributors for direct deposit to

check with their banks to, perhaps, change the end date of their deposit arrangement to be 'indefinite'. This ensures that your continued offering to our church through direct deposits will be ongoing. You are also reminded that giving through direct deposit is a convenient way to make your offering on a weekly, fortnightly or monthly or whenever you can basis. You make the arrangement with your bank and then it will appear on the monthly ANZ bank statement for confidential entry into our finance system.

- Donations of \$1,000 was made to our Burnett Network of Churches to support local ministers with travel costs over the vast region and \$2,000 was made to Uniting Care Community in Hervey Bay to support their charitable work with this being funded from Container Exchange program monies received.
- Property Related Costs were overspent but included tree trimming at manse and church, new air-conditioner at manse, removalist costs furniture back to storage with arrival of new minister's furniture, short term furniture hire.

At the half year point of 2024 Financial Year, Dan Dinna House account was close to budget. Expenses were less due to ongoing savings in electricity after installation of new solar panels by 60s and Better group through grant they received. Bank balance at 31 December was \$9,421.75.

At the half year point of the 2024 Financial Year, Hervey Bay Uniting Church account position in actual income and expenses was a \$17,041 deficit. Budget plan was an expected \$10,732 deficit so the difference between actual position and budget was \$6,309.

Income includes the Retiring Offering funds of approximately \$2,130, Christmas bowl of \$835.95 and \$3,500 donations from Adult Fellowship for Special Project. All amounts have or will be expended January/February 2024.

Also included in Income total are the weekly offerings which have minimally increased which may be due to some new members but, more significantly, to some church members on 'catchup' with an offering amount of several hundred dollars as they haven't been able to attend church services regularly and the direct deposit option is not one for them.

Apart from the fixed expenses such as Minister and Office Secretary labour related costs; rates, insurance, electricity, Presbytery payments, we have also had greater expenditure in stationery / printing / photocopying and for catering for the 2 Christmas Carols events and special Give Thanks service. There have been minimal overspends in other expense accounts that contribute to the overspend of \$7,684. Expenditure for Special Projects have been adjusted against the Expenses total. Details of that expenditure is presented further in this report.

Bank balance for Hervey Bay Uniting Church at 31 December was \$63,792.51.

Other financial matters for your information include:

- \$132,500 bequest received with \$100,000 invested UCIS short term investment for 6 mths at 5.15% and balance of \$32,500 held for special projects funding. Details of special projects expenditure is presented below for your information.
- Special Project Funding was made available through the bequest mentioned in the previous point. These funds have been used across our Hervey Bay Uniting Church congregations as below in the 2023 FY and 2024 FY to December 2023:

- Mission Development Fund (MDF) balance at 1 July 2022 was \$94,005. Amount of \$18,145 was approved for construction of a new 6m x 6m shed at the manse at 22 Kent Street, Torquay and \$716 for garage door remote-control system. With \$3,083 interest received during the financial year, the balance at 30 June 2023 was \$78,227. A further amount of \$5,770 was approved/expended for external awning near the OASIS room in September 2023

A financial plan for the 2024 financial year has been approved by Mary Burnett Presbytery for new security screens at the church and for improvements/repairs to our carpark with estimates of nearly \$56,000. Approximately \$17,000 will remain which may be transferred to Mary Burnett Presbytery central MDF account at some future time. We will still be able to access these funds through usual application process, but all Mary Burnett Presbytery congregations will be transferred to a single MDF account for our presbytery region.

- Audit of all financial records for the 2023 Financial Year were submitted to our Auditor and were completed in December 2023. A considerable review of accounts was undertaken as part of this audit on advice from the Auditor so that the balance sheet now reflects the current situation with historical data from many years ago now journalled to clear. Favourable report was again received from the Auditor.
- Annual returns for 12 months to June 2023 were submitted to Mary Burnett Presbytery within the specified timeframe despite delays in audit to clear specific accounts.

In Summary:

As I am no longer continuing in the Treasurer role from the end of the 2024 financial year, I have been considering options to ensure our church continues to comply with the financial directions from Synod, Australian Taxation office and general financial legislations.

With no one forthcoming to take on the full Treasurer role, I have been consulting with the BookKeeping Services of our Synod who are able to take on majority of financial management activity for our church. A proposal is being considered by Church Council on 20 January 2024 which will, hopefully, receive consensus to proceed with a plan to merge Dan Dinna House and Hervey Bay MYOB and bank accounts for the conversion to the Xero finance system. This will mean that BookKeeping Services will only need to manage a single financial file and single bank account as having 2 accounts has proven problematic at times.

With consensus from Church Council, there will be considerable work to prepare current financial documentation for audit at 31 March 2024 ready for conversion to new finance system XERO and BookKeeping Services from 1 April 2024. There will then be a 2nd audit 1 April to 30 June 2024 to comply with our current practice of operating under the financial year period.

Expected cost of this arrangement with BookKeeping Services will be covered by cessation of monthly honorarium to Treasurer and savings as billing for MYOB system will also cease.

I have discussed this change to financial activities with my valued supporters, Louise Crittenden, Christine Foster and Lorraine Pryor who will continue to generate sales invoices, prepare and submit documents and monies from weekly offerings or other donations and general processes for payments to suppliers. Under the new arrangement, there will no longer be a Treasurer in the sense of how that role has always been, as the role of the Treasurer under the new practices will be to oversee some financial activity and work with BookKeeping Services as needed. And I will be available to ensure that this transition flows smoothly into the new financial year.

I take this opportunity to again thank my Finance Team for their support and commitment to helping in Financial Management of our church during my time as Treasurer – Christine Foster as Banking Officer, Lorraine Pryor as backup Treasurer and Louise Crittenden for managing invoicing and finalising outgoing payments.

In closing this annual report, I thank our Congregations for their on-going generosity in giving and pray that will continue and increase in 2023/2024 so that we may remain as the Hervey Bay Uniting Church, open to our people and to welcome others in our worship of our Lord.

Property Report

Considerable property improvements have been achieved throughout the year.

A new 6 x 6 shed was constructed at the manse property and this will allow storage which was lacking previously. A new air conditioning unit was fitted in the manse lounge room and no further repairs are required. MDF funds were used for the shed and HBUC paid for the electrical installation. At the same time the electrician fitted a new switchboard.

Howard

Re-stumping of the Howard Church and new front stairs to replace the old timber ones was completed.

Dan Dinna House

Dan Dinna house has been painted internally, new fans installed in the hall section and the annual resurfacing of the timber floor completed.

Hervey Bay

A commercial grade dishwasher was installed in the HBUC kitchen with electrical work to install a 15 amp circuit and replace two power outlets.

An awning was built along the side of the church where Oasis meets to help keep out rain. This was paid for by MDF funds.

Regular checks and maintenance of Fire Safety items, Air Conditioning and electrical systems has been carried out.

Extensive repairs to the front driveway were completed with Blue Care contributing half of the costs.

All our properties are currently in a good state of repair.

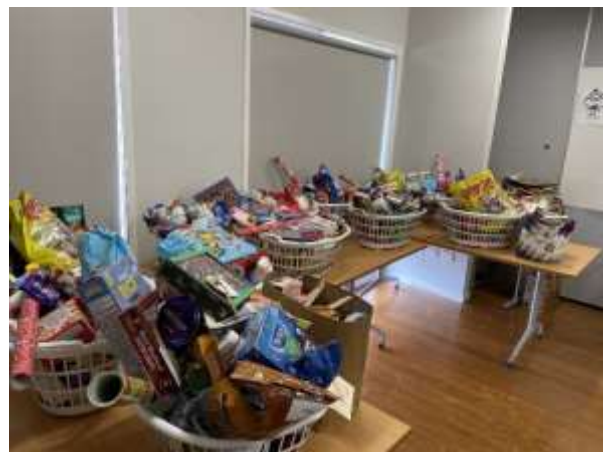

We Care 2 Uniting Church Wednesday Breakfast Van

Since taking over the Co-Ordinator's position from Lynn Furness in January 2023 I have found this position rewarding and an absolute delight to have the opportunity to work with a wonderful volunteer team prepared to start their day before 5am to give their time and love to those in need.

Many of the needy come each week. It is easy to recognise the hardship and loneliness they endure and it is our mission to welcome God's guests as family. With this approach it is lovely to see them relax and lighten up as they feel the warmth of God's love and compassion around them

We have to expect that some have had difficult lives from a young age. Abuse flares from time to time, a result of enduring and confusing hardships, whether from family or the community. We are all God's guests and we all need prayers to help guide us, especially when serving them and listening to them. We

cannot stop their abusive manner, but we can listen quietly and let the abuse go by. At times one small but positive encouragement can change their whole day. I encourage our volunteers to always view these situations from the perspective of the traumatised person rather than feeling traumatised ourselves.

Lyn Furness provided a 'Procedure' for the van ladies and another for the men (cooking/driving). When We Care 2 advises new changes procedures are automatically amended to reflect the change.... note procedures have changed 10 times over the past year. Two months ago, the van was stolen and soon after the ute, so previous arrangements went 'out the window' and alternate urgent measures had to be put in place. Our drivers now arrive at Apex Park at 5.30am in preparation for a 6am start and finish at 8am. Previously we refilled the van at WC2 which proved messy as items were never in the same place twice and WC2 personnel kept changing. My aim for 2024 was to have We Care 2 take full responsibility for van refilling and just one procedure for both ladies & men.....this has already happened.

I can't express my gratitude enough to those who have supported the Wednesday breakfast program over the past year: the Uniting Church, Rachael and Andrew at the Torbay Retirement Village and their in-house Village Resident's Committee (VRC), the angel who regularly donates clothing and household items collected from the Howard community, the WOW girls, UC Admin Manager Louise, who is always there when I yell for help, and the Filipino Community members who donated 3 washing baskets full of food and Christmas goodies, enough for breakfasts on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. The Filipino Group informed me their donation is worth over \$650!! People are truly kind and caring! How blessed we are. Lastly, I must thank those unsung heroes who stop at the breakfast park with donations saying just thought someone somewhere may be in need of..... and away they go! God bless them.

Throughout the year our volunteers (and God's guests) have not been without personal challengers. While their difficulties may vary, our prayers have been constant in supporting those in need of God's wisdom and compassion. Our mainstay, John Deitsch, will be absent for seven months together with his wife, Elaine as they support their daughter Sarah and husband, Aubrey, as grandson, Ziggy, battles many medical issues. He will have to undergo 6 months of chemotherapy. Please continue to pray regularly for his family.

- **Children's activity** at the annual Community Christmas Party.
- **Mother's Day** Devonshire morning tea served in the hall.
- **Facebook** social media page to share information about church activities with an average reach of 900 people for posts. An enquiry resulted in a child baptism.

Activities

Major activities during the year were Christmas Carols, Tombola and the Memorial Garden. Carols was a little earlier in December and was well attended. Grant support was again received from Fraser Coast Regional Council and Hervey Bay City Musicians, as an enhanced group supplied the music. Many of the locals attended and the audience was larger than previous years.

Our Tombola was a great success both financially and in attendance. Thanks go to the dedicated team who spend six months preparing for this activity.

Our Memorial Wall will hopefully progress with the creation of our dove sculpture that is to be the centrepiece. The first orders of plaques have been submitted ready to affix once the doves are in place.

Our Food is Free table has been looking a little bare but hopefully the next season of growth will see surpluses again being provided and shared.

Regular two monthly meetings have kept the church members informed and provided a platform for their input.

Maintenance

An aging wooden building needs constant attention and our grounds need to be kept neat as an outward sign of God's creation. With the help of many at working bees and regular cleaning and mowing, we have maintained the property and ensured that all fire and electrical safety checks are conducting annually.

Finance

In accordance with standard practice, our accounts have been kept and presented for external audit. Accounts have been audited as at 30th June 2023.

Income for the year was \$11,069 with \$6,142 from donations and Tombola. Other funds were received from hiring of the hall and recycling containers.

Expenses totalled \$7,925 which included rates, cleaning and mowing, fundraising costs, insurance and maintenance.

Our profit of \$3,144 was added to our retained surplus to provide a bank balance of \$21,280- which will be used for future maintenance and planned projects.
